# Neighborhood roundup

#### Improvements & Proposals

Thanks to everyone who has responded to the many proposals to improve traffic and discourage speeders and cut-throughs. Of the numerous proposals, there are three left on the table for discussion. Please note that, to date, there has been minimal opposition to these proposals, so if you have reasons why these proposed improvements will NOT work, let us know as soon as possible. The FSNA Improvements Committee recently met with Regina Flynn, Captain Callahan, Bruce Thibodeau and his crew on Monday, April 14, and the

City is ready to come to our aid, so we need to make sure that we are ready for them.

Proposal 1 - Close off the Lynn Street/River Street/Bridge Street "ramp," connect River to Lynn and creating a greenspace/park/parking area to buffer against Bridge Street.

**Proposal 2 -** Reverse the direction of Beckford Street

**Proposal 3 -** Allow traffic on North Street (travelling north) to make the left turn onto Essex Street at the Jerry's Army/Navy traffic light.

Currently, traffic wishing to come from Riley Plaza to Highland Avenue is using Federal Street as the means to get to that destination. Special thanks to Will Wrightson and Eric Bassett for their recommendations here. Even Captain Callahan applauded the idea!

With respect to physical impediments/parking problems we have a new proposal (Captain Callahan's suggestion) to allow Resident Parking on both sides of Federal Street from North Street to Federal Court. Narrowing Federal Street at the top will alert drivers that they need to proceed with caution at reduced speeds. We will continue to work on designing crosswalks that will also provide vehicles with additional caution awareness. After a very difficult winter, Captain Callahan will replace our "No Trucks Barrel" at the crosswalk in front of Murphy's Funeral Home. We have found it to be very successful and good a temporary aid until we can finalize thoughts on the size of an island, or how a raised crosswalk built with bricks and cobblestone will work. The City and FSNA are continuing to look at this major intersection from all angles, so if anyone has ideas, please let us know.

The sidewalk area in front of 92 Federal St. will be our first project in collaboration with the City. Work is scheduled to begin at the end of May, and we plan on replacing the bricks, river rocks and hopefully a tree (if possible – many times the root formation from the previous tree is so extensive that a new tree will not survive).

Our second project target is the Lynn Street/River Street area, which, if approved, will be a major undertaking but one that we feel will have positive results for everyone in our neighborhood. We'll keep you posted.

### Federal Court News

The "big ole stump" that used to stick up out of the street (literally) has fallen down. Luckily nobody was injured and there was no property damage. "Ole Woodensides" collapsed at approximately 3 o'clock in the morning and neighbors woke up to see numerous work crews and fire officials surveying the area. According to eye witnesses, the stump was virtually hollow due to rot from disease, insects, and animal infestation. Our Neighborhood Improvements Committee has met with the City officials and engineers who will be coming to Federal Court in the next few months to remove the rest of the root and asphalt/hot-top the street so that it will be safer for pedestrians and car traffic.
